





AITPM MEMBERSHIP GROWTH


Broader transport community regularly receiving AITPM communications for events, jobs, and conference

The AITPM conference is always the highlight of the annual calendar for TMN. "The modelling workshop, Bill Allen's keynote address and the YPN debate were three events that stood out," says TMN Chair Steven Piotrowski. "The annual TMN planning day where all members of the TMN congregate in one place to plan the year ahead was another highlight."

BURNING ISSUES

In the Strategic Modelling area, several Government agencies have decided to build Activity-Based Models and others are considering it. These types of models are very expensive to build, are highly complex and have excessive run times. Although they have the potential to provide answers to difficult questions, there are several challenges for their widespread use which have not yet been resolved. It remains to be seen whether our traditional trip-based models will be replaced by these new models or whether we will need to run multiple model types in parallel for different purposes.

>>> FUTURE FOCUS

Continuing our traditional annual activities and events: hosting modelling related in-person and online webinars in each state and territory and helping to organise the Modelling Workshop at the annual conference.





Taking Opportunities

AITPM's Emerging Professionals Network (EPN) is for members with up to 10 years' transport experience and provides support for students interested in learning more about the industry, as well as those already in the sector.

Each AITPM state branch hosts several events every year, tailored specifically to the needs and interests of younger professionals. These events include career development sessions, technical forums, and tours of major transport projects.

We rounded off 2023 with social networking event centred on 'Affordable Vibrant Living' and celebrated the end of the year with drinks.

Early in 2024, we again collaborated with the NSW State Committee, hosting an International Women's Day event featuring diverse and knowledgeable panellists.





The VIC/TAS EPN had a fruitful financial year with four events, assisting the National Conference in Melbourne. The VIC/TAS EPN committee contributed to different aspects of the National Conference, from reviewing abstracts and program setting to contacting speakers and organising events. At the conference, we hosted a Meet & Greet morning tea at the Modelling Workshop opening day and a thought-provoking debate between Industry Experts and Young Professionals on 'Private cars will always be king in Australia'.

The Buddy Program continued as an annual tradition in Victoria and connects more than 10 pairs of emerging professionals and graduating students. We started with a collaboration event with PIA Young Planners in June, bringing together planning and transport with speakers from public and private sectors.

In October, we ran a collaboration with ITS Australia NextGens and Young ITE, Transport Australia Society (TAs) and Young Transport Professionals (YTP) and hosted a Melbourne EP Trivia Night. In November the 2023 Buddy Program wrapped up with closing drinks.

In 2024, Monash University and the committee co-hosted the 'Careers in Transport Industry' featuring three outstanding speakers from diverse backgrounds to share their journeys and stories in transport with graduating students.





This year the Queensland EPN committee averaged one event per month, a new record for the committee.

The formal election process saw a new group of members become involved in the committee, bringing fresh ideas and an eagerness to deliver quality and consistent events. We continued the mentoring program, with 10 mentor/mentee pairings in the 2023 program, and in March we officially ioined the Urban Unwind collaboration between Planning Institute of Australia (PIA), Australian Institute of Landscape Architects (AILA) and Australian Institute of Architects (AIA), providing a monthly opportunity to catch up with emerging professionals in the urban space.





In the past year, the WA EPN has curated a range of engaging events, providing platforms for emerging professionals and enthusiasts in transport, city shaping and planning to connect and develop personally and professionally.

The year commenced with the 'YPN Bowls Night' in May 2023, where attendees enjoyed an evening of friendly competition and networking on the greens. The 'Young Professionals Showoff Night' in August showcased the ingenuity and talent of professionals in an environment of knowledge exchange and inspiration.

The EPN welcomed the new year with a lawn bowls event, blending recreation with networking. These events have not only facilitated professional growth but also cultivated a sense of camaraderie and belonging.

Looking ahead, the WA EPN will be injecting vitality at the upcoming National Conference in Perth, representing diverse perspectives from future industry leaders.






AITPM EVENTS WRAP



AITPM continues to be a key source of CPD and networking opportunities for the transport community. Branches hosted 90 events across FY 2023/2024, which is an increase of 4% from the previous financial year.

In addition to our flagship national events, the AITPM National Transport Conference and the Online Technical Conference Series, we held 17 online events and 73 in-person events. In-person events made up 81% of all events held last financial year in mainland state capitals Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane, Adelaide, and Perth, as well as in locations including the Gold Coast and Toowoomba.

More than 2500 individuals engaged with our events, of whom 1343 were members or subscribers, with just over 6250 event registrations received in total.

MELBOURNE, 13-15 SEPTEMBER 2023

Sustainability, placemaking and connectivity – the keys to a successful transport future

The 2023 conference was our biggest and best yet, with more than <u>600 delegates</u> hearing from industry experts, connecting with other professionals, and participating in conversations that will significantly shape future communities.

The conference format encouraged questions, conversations, and debate, and featured leading speakers from Australia and overseas.

With its title of 'Pathways to a Connected Modern Australia', the conference focused on the themes of <u>Sustainability</u>, <u>Placemaking</u>, <u>and Connectivity</u>. Its organisation was the result of outstanding <u>work behind the scenes</u> from the conference organising committee, led by co-conveners Mike Willson and Emily Coldbeck, who are both based in Melbourne.

From sourcing and arranging keynote speakers and sorting through presentations to booking venues and organising registration and catering companies, the time and effort put in by the volunteers – who all have day jobs as well – was extraordinary.

The opening day at the iconic MCG featured the increasingly popular <u>Transport Modelling Workshop</u>, which this year attracted more than 200 professionals, the C-ITS workshop, and the welcome reception.

Over the following two days, <u>presentations</u> and speakers addressed and discussed how our strong transport community can better tackle the challenges created by the climate crisis and improve connectivity and accessibility across Australia.

Our <u>Emerging Professionals</u> found the conference particularly inspiring, learning from leaders, making new friends, and extending their networks. A <u>gala awards presentation</u> night was held on 14 September, celebrating the achievements of seven AITPM members who received Emerging Professionals Awards.

Insights from the AITPM Online Technical Conference Series 2023/2024

In its fourth year, the Online Technical Conference Series (OTCS) saw close to 250 participants engage live and ondemand with 52 expert transport industry speakers.

Presentations were received from speakers across four streams – Plan, Design, Model and Manage – and sparked conversations on the most pressing key industry issues and insights. The conference's on-demand content, including live Q&A sessions and presenter videos, has already recorded 2.200 member views.

Women making their mark in transport

It was the year 2000 when economic geographer Alison Holloway attended her first AITPM conference.

Alison was working at a Sydney advisory firm at the time and felt the event would be an opportunity to network and take on new ideas. She enjoyed the conference but was disappointed by the lack of women and young professionals.

"Out of about 250 attendees, about 10% were women and there were probably even fewer young people," she says. "It did prompt me to rethink if it was the right industry for me."

Alison did decide to stay in the transport sector and is now CEO of SGS Economics and Planning. She was delighted to take to the podium as one of the keynote speakers at the 2023 national conference – and equally pleased to see the composition of the conference had changed.

More than 30% of the delegates at the 2023 conference were women, along with many of the presenters and other speakers, as well of course, as AITPM leaders CEO Kirsty Kelly, AITPM President Liz McGregor, and various branch leaders.

Transport planner Vanina Varnier, is vice-president of the AITPM Queensland branch and encourages young women entering the industry to know their own value.

"My advice would be to back yourself, charge ahead, and insert yourself into situations," she says. "If you can, finding mentors who you can learn from and who may have even paved the way - a good mentor will stay with you for your career."
